Hon Tariana Turia

Associate Minister of Health, responsible for Whānau Ora

Hon Tariana Turia (*Ngā Wairiki/Ngāti Apa, Ngā Rauru, Tuwharetoa, Whanganui*) is co-leader of the Māori Party and the member of parliament for Te Tai Hauauru since July 2002. Currently she sits outside of cabinet as Minister for Disability Issues and the Community and Voluntary Sector, as well as holding associate ministerial positions in both health and social development and representing Māori on several cabinet committees.

Minister Turia has dedicated much of her time to achieving improved health outcomes for Māori. For the greater part of her time in Parliament she has played a significant role in developing government policies and strategies for improving the health and wellbeing of whānau Māori, hapu, iwi and communities nationwide. Her role within the current government builds on her previous work within Māori health in and outside of Parliament.

Nancy is the Manager of the Whanganui River Māori Trust Board. She is also a member of the Whānau Ora Taskforce and a Ministerial Appointee to the Whanganui District Health Board and a Hauora A Iwi representative on the Mana Whenua Partnership group. Nancy is Co-Chair of the Whanganui Community Taskforce on Youth Wellbeing collaboration between the District Council, Government Ministries, the Youth Sector and Whanganui Iwi.

Technically Nancy's foundation in Whānau Ora began in her former employment at Te Puni Kokiri and Te Oranganui Iwi Health Authority. However she attributes most of her learnings to her own Whānau Ora having been a whangai mother to her niece and nephews for a period of time during their teens and a single mother to her son.



Professor Innes Asher

Professor Asher is a highly regarded paediatrician, researcher and advocate for children.

She is a respiratory paediatrician at Starship, leads a major worldwide epidemiological study into childhood asthma and allergies, and is Head of the Department of Paediatrics at the University of Auckland. She is a spokesperson for the Child Poverty Action Group and a contributing author to their cornerstone report *Left Behind: How social and income inequalities damage NZ children*.

Professor Asher was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to paediatrics in 2003. She was awarded the Health Research Council Liley Medal for research leadership in 2007.
