Fuimaono is a Pacific health consultant, with many years of professional experience in public health and mental health. He has led the development of Fonofale, a Pacific health model. **Fuimaono** will present on *Fonofale* as a Pacific health model.

Sione Tu'itahi

Sione is the Workforce Development and Communications Manager, Health Promotion Forum of New Zealand. He is also the Acting Director Pasifika at Massey University, leading the implementation of the Pasifika@Massey Strategy. **Sione** will present on Fonua, a Pasifika health promotion model he has developed and will further interrogate in his current doctoral research.

Ieti Lima

Ieti is Senior Health Promotion Strategist – Pacific at the Health Promotion Forum. He is a Social Science and health researcher. He is currently a Senior Researcher on a multi-government agency research project led by the Ministry of Pacific Island Affairs. **Ieti** will present an overview of the need for, and relevance of Pacific health models, such as *Fonofale* and *Fonua* which Fuimaono and Sione will present, respectively.
